The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Objectives and aims

The company supports and promotes the advancement of citizenship and community development, including rural regeneration and civic responsibility. To this end, the company carries out activities:

- To encourage and actively support the development of an inclusive and sustainable Scottish rural movement that is rooted in Scotland's rural communities and empowers and connects them.
- To support the organisation of a Scottish Rural Parliament that meets with the purpose of giving a stronger, more coherent voice to Scotland's rural communities and enabling them to engage more effectively with government at all levels.
- To support and promote the development of a Scottish rural movement and Parliament.

Between April - July 2019, Scottish Rural Action's Board refreshed its Strategy and agreed the following vision, outcomes and activity areas which will be delivered in partnership with others:

- Our vision is to help improve the lives of people and communities in rural Scotland, and reduce VISION rural inequality.
- Rural communities across Scotland have equal access to services, resources and opportunities, and OUTCOME 1 the rights and wellbeing of those living in rural Scotland are promoted and protected.
- A growing and sustainable rural network with an effective and diverse range of voices heard and **OUTCOME 2** responded to in local, national and public life.

Under these outcomes, the Board identified five discrete activity areas or 'pillars' that will enable SRA fulfil its mission. These are:

- Thematic: Exploring emerging topics of interest to rural communities, including our "Rural Homes, Rural Lives" campaign delivered in partnership with Rural Housing Scotland.
- Rural Mainstreaming: Engaging with policy and decision makers to ensure rural communities are considered and involved from policy inception.
- Rural Movement: Building a collaborative network and shared platform for the rural areas, their people and 3. many organisations engaged in rural development.
- Cross-Cutting: Ensuring our communications and outreach achieves maxim reach and relevance across geography and interests.
- Business Development: Creating a viable, well managed and sustainable organisation

The review of the organisation's Strategy took place at a time of change for SRA. This involved changes in the funding and staffing.

During this period, SRA's grant support from the Scottish Government was under review, after six years. Confirmation of future funding was predicted on a review by the James Hutton Institute. The review process was delayed for some months, and the report was finally published in December 2019. During the review period on short term funding was available for staffing etc. The conclusions of the review enable SRA and its stakeholders, including the Scottish Government, to move with confidence into the next phase of the organisation's growth and development.

Prior to the review, SRA staffing had also changed: The Policy & Communications Officer had left in October 2018 and the CEO in February 2019. In June 2019, the Volunteering & Campaigns Coordinator took up a new post. Following the review process, in January 2020, SRA advertised for new Trustees and for a salaried National Coordinator to support the Board. Three new Trustees were appointed at SRA's AGM on the 27th February 2020. The National Co-ordinator was appointed in March 2020 and took up the post on the 6th April 2020.

2019-20 was a challenging year but against the backdrop of the COVID-19 pandemic, the influx of new people, new energy and new ideas meant SRA embarked on 2020-21 with a sense of renewed purpose and enormous potential. The work carried out in 2019-20, delivered in the main by thousands of volunteer hours put in by trustees and other volunteers with support from our Finance & Administration Officer and two consultants, kept momentum going on SRA's thematic projects and building a rural movement. Some achievements from this period include:

- The Highlands and Islands Air Transport Survey Report which was produced in collaboration with SRUC at the request of Scottish Government.
- The continued promotion of our "Rural Homes, Rural Lives" campaign in partnership with Rural Housing Scotland.
- Participation in the implementation of the Open Government in Scotland Action Plan 2018-20. The aim of
 this working group was to bring together state and civic society partners who share an improving democratic
 processes and outcomes across Scotland, in particular, supporting work to place people at the heart of public
 service design and delivery.
- National Stakeholder Event inviting key organisations to discuss and debate the issues affecting rural communities and determine whether a co-ordinated approach would strengthen the rural voice.
- The delivery of six regional workshops entitled, 'Your Voice Matters' looking at funding and the
 perceptions/expectations of rural communities about a rural movement. Discussions and information from
 these workshops helped shape the programme for the SRA National Conference.
- Our National Conference and AGM was held in February 2020 at New Lanark World Heritage Site. The
 conference sought to explore the challenges and opportunities facing rural communities. The programme
 included plenaries, field visits and participatory workshops.
- 7. The SRA Climate Emergency Working Group was set up after the 2019 Rural Parliament to examine how rural communities can contribute to reducing greenhouse gas emissions. The working groups devised two workshops which were held at the SRA Conference, identifying themes and examples of pioneering good practice in specific communities that have been shared with the SRA network.
- SRA was a partner in an EU funded ERP project on the impacts of Brexit on rural UK. Five delegates from SRA attended the European Rural Parliament held in Asturias, Spain in November 2019.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Review

There is usually a significant difference in our turnover depending on whether the accounts are for a year in which the Rural Parliament is held. The turnover in 2020 departs from this pattern. The Board of Directors were successful in obtaining funding for this and the subsequent year before 31 March 2020. This is represented in a higher level of turnover at £184,497, £60,000 of which is funding for 2020/21. In addition, SRA hosted a two-day conference which coincided with our AGM in February 2020. This attracted sponsorship of £24,579 which covered much of the cost.

Significant changes in the pattern of expenditure are also apparent from these accounts. As described above, the SRA's staff team was considerably smaller than in the previous year and this is reflected in a lower salary cost. This is offset in part by an increase in Trustee expenses. This increase was due partly to Trustees undertaking a significant amount of operational work on a voluntary basis in order to maintain SRA's core activities.

The Board of Directors is grateful to SRA's funders and sponsors for supporting its activities throughout the year and helping achieve a worthwhile conference. In particular, the Board would like to thank the Scottish Government's Rural Communities Team, South Lanarkshire LEADER, Impact Funding Partners and Scottish Rural Network.

The Scottish Government remains the primary core funder for Scottish Rural Action and this is noted as a significant risk to the organisation. The Trustees recognise the need to diversify SRA's income and are currently developing a Fundraising Plan linked to the new Strategy and five work pillars.

Reserves policy

Scottish Rural Action usually seeks to retain reserves the equivalent of three months operating costs and sufficient to meet our obligations in full upon deciding to close the organisation. At 31 March 2020 SRA held £172,000.

FUTURE PLANS

Against the backdrop of COViD-19, Brexit and climate change, Scotland's communities currently contend with great uncertainty and change. Whilst this is creating significant challenges, it also presents opportunities. SRA, in partnership with others at local and national levels, intends to strengthen the voice and agency of Scotland's rural communities and build platforms where rural people can collectively re-imagine their future and realise their ambitions. The Scottish Rural Parliament has been postponed for a year, until Autumn 2021. Instead, SRA will seek to take full advantage of virtual communications technology to take forward our programme of work.

The programme will be carried out in four stages:

- 1. On-line surveys
- 2. A series of regional and thematic events
- 3. A major virtual conference to enable a collective vision and strategy
- Supporting advocacy and action to enable this vision and strategy to translate into policy and resources for rural communities

Underpinning this work programme is a commitment to involving the less heard community voices in debate and action.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

SRA is a Scottish Charity and a Company limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006 and is governed by its Articles of Association

Staffing structure

At the end of June 2019, Fiona Thompson left for pastures new. The Trustees thank her for her contribution and wish her well in her new role.

The staffing structure of SRA during the year was as follows:

Volunteer & Campaigns Coordinator - Fiona Thompson (0.6FTE) until the end of June 2019 thereafter, vacant. Finance & Administration Officer - Barbara Grieve (0.25 FTE, rising to 0.53FTE in September 2019)

Induction and training of new trustees

New members of the Board attend an induction meeting and are provided with an initial information pack containing previous minutes of Board meetings and literature associated with the business of the organisation. The Trustees receive ongoing, appropriate training by attendance at organisational development days, governance training as part of regular board meetings and other volunteer development sessions.

Risk management

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. To strengthen governance and due diligence, in January 2019 the board decided to create a new Compliance and Risk Committee, chaired by one of the new board members with a strong background in compliance and risk. Existing procedures and policies, as well as the existing risk register were reviewed and improved, with additional policies and a new risk management strategy agreed. All board members are given compliance and risk and GDPR (General Data Protection Regulation) training to improve overall knowledge and ensure compliance with legislation.

The Trustees considered the greatest risk to SRA in the year to March 2020 was the absence of secured core funding.

As time without core funding has progressed since the year end and the independent evaluation commission by Scottish Government was unavoidably delayed, the risk increased. The Trustees' prudence in maintaining an appropriate level of reserves has proven valuable. The Trustees also recognise the useful contribution Scottish Government has made to ensure SRA can continue with some of its work for rural communities. The Trustees are grateful for Scottish Government's solid and continued support after the year end.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery

- 33% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
